Due to the ongoing health crisis, we have found it necessary to consolidate the following polling places in order to adequately staff polling places for the upcoming general election. We have based our decisions on an 80% overall turnout for the election. Of that 80% turnout, we have estimated that 60% would vote in person and 40% would vote by mail. We did our best to make sure that the consolidations selected have minimal impact on voters on election day. We have provided additional information that shows the combined registration numbers for each proposed consolidation, polling place name, voting equipment, election judge information, and a site layout. Based on the consolidation, Allegany County will have 20 polling places for the 2020 Presidential General Election instead of 36.

Good Afternoon to the Board of Elections.

My name is Ben Frey. I manage the election systems in Somerset County. I also have the honor of serving on the MAEO Board.

You have heard, and will hear, a consensus amongst Election Directors, Deputy Directors, and others of us on the front lines of Maryland elections regarding how to conduct the upcoming Presidential election. I will not repeat the critical points being made by others.

All I wish to present is a plea, also supported by local election officials, that the State Board of Elections come to a unified position on the proposals we are making.

What Maryland elections is facing is an impossible task, multiple impossible tasks, to fulfill our obligations to manage a safe, successful election, in an environment that is surely unique and demands both creative and flexible thinking.

A genuine, honest, and respected difference of opinion is an essential part of the conversation in a democratic society. But in order to make progress, to achieve common goals, eventual compromise is also an essential component.

My point is, at this meeting and after hearing numerous appeals from around the state, to ask the State Board of Elections to a consensus and make an unambiguous declaration to the Governor that the State Board of Elections clearly supports the voices and priorities of local election officials. This will require an acknowledgement from all of you that you can't always get what you want, but we in the trenches must get what we need.

By voting unanimously on our proposals and presenting to the Governor an explicit declaration of support for Election Directors and their staff, the State Board of Elections becomes a true ally of the LBEs.

At its August 3, 2020 meeting, the Frederick County Board of Elections approved the merger of Precincts 07-005 and 07-006, to mask the identity of the few voters in Precinct 07-006. The existing precincts are in the same congressional district, but different county council districts, which is not a factor in this year's general election. Current active voter registration in the existing precinct 07-006 is 3. The total voter registration in the merged Precinct 07-005 is 94. The map of the new precinct boundaries is enclosed.

Because Section 2-303(b) of the Election Law prevents any precinct boundary or polling place change from the Tuesday that is 13 weeks prior to the primary election until after the general election, the Frederick County Board of Elections is requesting that the State Board of Elections approve this precinct change for the November 3, 2020 General Election.

RESOLVED, that the revised precinct lines for Election District 07 Precinct 005 are as follows:







Governor Hogan and Members of the State Board of Elections:

We, the undersigned members of the Maryland General Assembly, are writing to respectfully urge you to support two specific actions:

- Sending ballots -- rather than mere applications -- to every registered voter in Maryland; and
- Changing the Election Day plan by opening up at least 90 large voting centers statewide -- instead of 1,848 neighborhood precincts.

First, the current plan to merely send applications -- rather than actual ballots -- to every registered voter in Maryland is extremely inefficient, including from a cost perspective. It also will confuse voters who participated in the June primary. And, most importantly, in the context of the global coronavirus pandemic, not sending ballots to every registered voter is a form of voter suppression. The reality is that, while there were issues with the administration of the June primary, it was a success, in terms of overall turnout, and 97% of the people who voted in the primary did so by mail. The bottom line is that, in this pandemic, mailing ballots to every registered voter promotes safety, accessibility, and voter participation.

Second, the current plan to open 1,848 neighborhood precincts is simply unworkable and -- again -- highly inefficient. The costs of operating all those polling sites is extremely high, particularly relative to the number of people who will opt to vote in person. And it is extremely and increasingly difficult to recruit poll workers to staff the sites that are part of the current plan. For example, just this week, an additional 1,000 poll workers dropped out. And, remarkably, 4 in 10 election judge jobs are vacant, at a relatively late stage in the process.

Many custodians of traditional polling locations have been either refusing to host voters or conditioning their hosting of voters on having the state pay to deep clean and sanitize their properties, like churches and community centers. Moreover, elections officials -- and -- more importantly, public health experts -- say that the public health crisis may worsen in September and October, which will cause even more poll workers to quit in large numbers. Historically, these workers tend to be elderly and retired individuals who, because of their age and pre-existing health conditions, are even more vulnerable to the worst potential complications of covid-19.

We understand that President Trump is very vocal in his opposition to mailing out ballots to every registered voter. However, we urge the governor of Maryland to put partisan priorities aside and to put the interests and safety of Maryland voters first.

For the sake of a free and fair 2020 general election, we urge you to support sending ballots to every registered voter in Maryland and to open up large voting centers that can process thousands of 'socially distanced' voters with minimal staff.

Thank you for your urgent attention to this matter.

Dear Administrator Lamone:

Ahead of the State Board of Elections' meeting tomorrow, I am writing to reiterate that I have no intention of interfering in your duty to conduct the upcoming general election. However, the Board must act with much greater urgency to fulfill its responsibility to conduct the election under state law:

- <u>Immediately mail out applications for voting by mail</u>. It is now more than four weeks since I directed the Board to promptly mail out ballot applications, and it still has not been done.
- <u>Immediately begin recruiting and training election judges.</u> As you know, my administration is actively recruiting election judges from within the ranks of state government. We are also encouraging college students to consider serving as judges as well. Local boards need to move aggressively to recruit and train judges to staff the polls, where state and CDC public health protocols will be in place.
- Open early voting centers and offer robust Election Day voting options. While existing law gives you the legal authority to make decisions regarding the consolidation of polling places in the case of an emergency, voters must have a sufficient number of polling places open in each jurisdiction during early voting and on Election Day. Proposals to close roughly 90% of polling places—particularly in minority communities—would result in voter suppression and risk violating the Voting Rights Act. You would also be increasing the potential for crowds of voters at the few open polling places, resulting in hours-long lines.

To reiterate: I have no plans to interfere in your conduct of the November election. Under existing state law, you have the authority and responsibility to manage and run a free and fair election. While you have emergency powers at your disposal to consolidate precincts and modify deadlines, I strongly advise against wholesale closures of polling places that could disenfranchise Marylanders.

The Board's continued delays and deflections are absolutely unacceptable. These are your decisions to make, and this is your responsibility to uphold. We cannot risk a repeat of the failures of the June primary.

- Consolidations are not new in Howard County. For the last 14 years we have run consolidated polling places in Howard County. For the past four election cycles (since 2012), we have consolidated 28 precincts with other precincts for every election. (We have 118 precincts in Howard County, but have used 90 polling places because of the 28 current consolidations.)
 Seven polling places of the original 90 had to be consolidated either way because of rejection of the contract due to COVID-19. (Senior centers, some community centers, nursing home facilities, 55+ Living facilities.)
- 2. Howard County would typically use around 1300 judges for the Presidential General Election. We currently have 542 judges that have answered affirmatively that they will work the polls. This constitutes an emergency as there is no feasible way that we can realistically expect to open 90 sites with only 41% of judges that we need to run polling places. Even with the current local-approved consolidations, we will need 805 judges to efficiently and effectively run the polling places, which is a more realistic number than garnering 1300.
- 3. Howard County has consolidated 90 polling places down to 35 polling places. We took care in ensuring that distances to the new polling places were not far, and that we kept consolidated polling places in an adjacent precinct to where the voters' home district/precinct was located. In many cases, the voter will vote where they usually vote, but polling places have been combined within the facility.
- 4. When consolidating the precincts, we tried to keep the number of registered voters to around the 8000 voters per consolidation mark. When doing projections, taking into consideration growth, voters that would do vote-by-mail, voters that would do early voting, and voters that would not vote, the numbers end up being on par or less than most of the individual sites would have seen on Election Day. Even if the numbers were to skew a couple percentage points towards Election Day, the consolidations would still be able to handle the voters. For many of the consolidations, the number of expected voters is less than 1000. (See attached chart, under the Proposed PG20 tab.)
- 5. The voters in the consolidations will not go in and out the same doors, will see the utilization of multiple rooms for the voting process (for example- the voters may check-in in the auxiliary gym and vote in the main gym, going in a door at the auxiliary gym and exiting a door in the main gym so that the voters never cross paths), and will benefit from the additional space utilized as more people will be allowed into the voting area at one time, while still having the ability to socially and physically distance per CDC guidelines within the multiple rooms of the voting area. Even in areas where only one room will be utilized, there will be ample space to execute all of the above procedures. (See attached sample polling place schematic.)

- 6. For the voter, there will not be an apparent difference in the mechanics of the polling place. All voters will still check-in, vote, and leave as they always do. By utilizing the technology at our fingertips, the process is streamlined on the front-end, and the end customer, the voter, besides possibly visiting a different location, will not see a change in the process outside of changes being performed because of COVID-19.
- 7. Voters will be provided with additional signage for voter entrances, social distancing signage, and voter pathway signage throughout the polling places.
- 8. Judges will be provided with walkie-talkies (two-way radios) to communicate efficiently between rooms in the polling places.
- 9. All voters that experience a polling place change will receive a new Voter Notification Card and a specimen ballot in the mail before the election. We will continue to advertise the changes on social media and prominently on our website, as well as ensure the state and the county change their polling place locators to reflect the current iteration of consolidations.

Re: 2020 General Election: In Person Voting - Vote Centers vs. Consolidations

Vote Centers and Consolidations are mitigation strategies for a local board to successfully conduct an election with a smaller than usual judge pool. Judge recruitment is a revolving door. We gain judges and lose judges almost as quickly. We would not be having any of these conversations if the problem was not real and tangible. The problem can simply not be ignored. If nothing is done, and we must staff Early Voting Centers and full polling places on Election Day, there will be process breakdowns, polls that will not open, and polls that do not have enough judges to effectively run an election.

We are essentially running two separate elections at once, a vote-by-mail election and a regular election. We do not have the ability to double or triple the amount of staff members that we currently employ. Being able to shrink numbers of judges and voters down into Vote Centers will be a tremendous step in the right direction to enable the local election boards to continue down a path of success.

Please note - all of the information below is being tied to the MAEO election plan submitted to the State Board of Elections on August 5, 2020, which includes Vote Centers in all counties from October 29 through November 3, 2020. The Election Directors from all other 24 Local Boards of Elections support this plan in full.

Will consolidations work? Yes. Will vote centers work? Yes, but better. The reasons are outlined below:

1. Less judges overall to conduct the election.

For example, in Howard County, under the MAEO plan, if there were seven (7) Vote Centers open for voting across this timeframe, there would be 1,050 judge assignments. Under the current proposed consolidation plan, for eight (8) days of Early Voting and consolidation of polling places on Election Day, there would be 1,600 slots. Doing nothing would result in 2,100 slots that need to be filled. The numbers will go up and down for each county depending on size for all three categories, but the end results will be the same.

Currently, Howard County has 562 people that have affirmed as of today that they will work the polls on Election Day, and under 200 that have affirmed that they will work Early Voting. At this point in the process, the less judge slots that we have to fill, the better chance we have of success.

2. Less judges means less election judge training. Vote centers mean only one kind of training for each judge.

By far, the most labor-intensive, time-consuming process that we execute is judge training.

By having less judge training, we have the ability to conduct smaller training classes to comply with COVID-19 guidelines if we have in-person training. Virtual training classes could have smaller sizes, which would provide the judges with a greater ability to ask questions and keep the classes to a certain timeframe.

Under the consolidation plan, judges that were willing to work both election day and early voting would have two different types of training because of the nuances in procedures between early voting and election day. We would have no choice but to put judges into multiple rooms to train them in-person (under COVID-19 guidelines), unless we found facilities large enough to hold regular-sized (25-50 people) training classes. There would be almost double the amount of training classes, as each judge that worked early voting would have a separate class. Virtual training would become cumbersome, as more people would have to be added to each class, creating elongated question and answer periods.

The end result of more training classes is the inability to work on mail-in ballot applications and ballots, meaning a delay in voters receiving ballots, a delay in the local boards processing returned ballots, and a delay in canvasses beginning. The consequence of this would be results from the vote-by-mail ballots would not be available for some time well after the election.

3. Less sites equals more process advantages, both in the polling place and in the office.

- A. With less sites to staff, the ability to correctly staff a site increases. Under COVID-19 voting guidelines, you must have sufficient workers to not only run the election, but to clean the equipment, tables, and protective barriers, to direct the voters throughout larger rooms and facilities, and facilitate the PPE process for every voter that enters the installation. If we spread the judges thin to open more sites, we will not have the ability to clean effectively, process voters in a timely manner, or simply run a polling place efficiently or effectively under current conditions.
- B. Less sites mean that a local staff can give centralized, real-time support from employees to individual vote centers. If we have consolidated precincts, we can assign an employee to oversee multiple polling places, anywhere from four to six (4-6) at one time. Under a Vote Center scheme, we can give one to one support to the vote center for immediate assistance with line management strategies, voter questions, judge concerns, and any other area of the process. This strategy produces an immediate positive impact on the voter experience in the center.
- C. Less time spent doing logic and accuracy testing (less equipment to test), less time spent packing judge supplies, and less time conducting the aforementioned judge trainings, results in more time for a local board staff to work on processing mail-in applications, processing returned ballots to ready for canvass, and actually perform canvasses of ballots to provide the public and candidates with results earlier than currently anticipated.

4. Voters can go to any polling place in their county to get a regular ballot.

Under the consolidation strategy, a voter would have to go to the correct consolidation to vote a regular ballot, and if they showed up at the wrong site, they would have to vote a provisional ballot, or go to the correct consolidation.

Under the Vote Center strategy, a voter could go to ANY vote center in the county and receive a regular ballot. Provisional ballots would be used less frequently.

Vote centers would be inherently less confusing for voters in this time of constant change from election to election. In Howard County, Baltimore City, and Baltimore County, this will be the fourth election held in 2020, and the fourth time the election will have been conducted differently. Too much change in too little time causes voter confusion and will have many unintended consequences.

5. There will be a cost-savings by using vote centers.

In this time of uncertainty of where the money is coming from to conduct processes in government, this would allow us to be more fiscally responsible.

- A. Less PPE would have to be acquired for the amount of election judges and vote centers that we would be utilizing when compared to any other plan.
- B. By not consolidating precincts, we would no longer have to send out Voter Notification Cards to every voter that has a new precinct, which would cost us not only money in printing, but also in human resources, as sending out thousands of cards is a lengthy, time-consuming process if done in house by a local board. If outsourced, the price goes up.
- C. Less judges utilized means less money coming out of the local board budget. Some of the money that previously would have been devoted to judges could be moved to cover other expenses in the election process as we conduct two different types of election at once.

6. Change voting hours to 7 AM to 8 PM for every day of the cycle.

This will allow for 10 additional hours of voting over the current schematic of voting, while making all voting hours the same for each day of the six-day process.

After consultation with every Election Director, MAEO proposes establishing the Vote Centers in each jurisdiction as listed on the attached 2020 General Election Turnout Estimate & Vote Center Requirements. We propose to create roughly double the number of vote centers as existing early voting sites, which includes feedback and adjustments from the Local Boards as necessary for each particular jurisdiction. Based on the turnout estimate, we will establish 162 vote centers statewide serving approximately 1,767 per sites over the course of six consecutive days of voting.

Local election officials are some of the most hard-working, intelligent, and savvy people that you will find in a workforce. We always do our best to pivot, think outside the box, and find resolution to difficult problems that we might face, and constantly try to mitigate circumstances before they become reality.

But, we need a clear path to success. Consolidations certainly will help us, but vote centers will afford us all of the aforementioned advantages to allow us to maximize our time and provide the level of customer service that the voters of Maryland deserve and have become accustomed to over the years.

Dear Chairman Cogan, Vice Chairman Hogan, and members of the Board,

Attached is a proposed direct mail piece for requesting a mail-in ballot for this fall's election. This would be a self-mailer that would be printed on a single sheet of card stock, folded in thirds.

There are many advantages of this approach compared with using a 4-piece package that includes a ballot request form, instructions, an outer mailing envelope, and a return envelope.

This simple form would:

- 1. Be more effective in persuading voters to receive their ballots by mail instead of electronically;
- 2. **Be faster and far less expensive to print** because it is a single sheet of card stock that could come off the printing press folded and ready to be addressed and mailed;
- 3. **Be faster and far less expensive to produce** because it is a stand-alone piece that would not require printing multiple pieces, collating, assembling, stuffing and addressing a multi-piece package:
- 4. Be less expensive to mail because it is much lighter than a multi-piece mailing;
- 5. **Be faster for elections offices to process upon receipt** because the voter's name and voter ID# barcode would already be on the form;
- 6. **Eliminate having to decipher a voter's handwriting** unless the voter requests that it be mailed to a different address than the one in the voter's registration;
- 7. **Be simpler for the voter to understand** because it would be clear that the mailer **does not contain a ballot**, and the alert on the outside would let them know they need to mail it back; and
- 8. **Provide a link** for those who do need to receive their ballots electronically or who prefer to use the online ballot request form.

When voters receive the mailer, they would:

- 1. **Fill out the request panel** by checking the appropriate box and providing a different address if necessary;
- 2. Sign & date it:
- 3. **Refold the mailer** so the Board of Elections address panel is on the outside;
- 4. Tape it shut; and
- 5. Drop it in the mail with prepaid postage.

When the local elections office receives it, they would:

- 1. Scan the voter ID# barcode on the outgoing address panel, which has been folded inside;
- 2. Open the voter's file and mark them as having requested a ballot; and
- 3. **Enter the address** if a different mailing address was requested.

This mailer would cost significantly less than a 4-piece mailer, both in printing and handling costs and in postage.

Most important, this mailer could be produced much more quickly than a 4-piece mailer, getting it into voters' hands sooner.

I would be happy to offer my services pro bono to refine the design of this mailer and add diagrams to the instructions, or I could provide my InDesign files to the designer of your choice.

I am the graphic designer for the University of Maryland Libraries (College Park), where I have served for more than 20 years creating all types of direct-mail pieces as well as <u>annual reports</u>, <u>magazines and other publications</u>, exhibits, and videos targeted at <u>potential donors</u>, <u>students</u>, and <u>other audiences</u>, for which our office has won numerous national and international awards.

Ms. Lamone,

The Talbot County Board of Elections held a Special Meeting on Friday, July 24, 2020. During that Special Meeting, the Talbot County Board of Elections unanimously found that an emergency exists due to the COVID-19 pandemic requiring the consolidation of three polling places for the upcoming Presidential General Election pursuant to Maryland Annotated Code, Election Law, § 2-303(f). The reasons for the determination that an emergency exists requiring consolidation of three polling places are explained herein below. For the reasons explained herein, the Talbot County Board of Elections respectfully requests that the State Board of Elections approves such request.

Due to the recommendation in the Governor's letter dated July 8, 2020 to the State Board of Elections, that polling places should follow CDC guidelines to include physical distancing, there are three polling places in Talbot County which are small and would not allow for the recommended social distancing. This would place the election judges and voters at potential health risk at these locations. The recommendations presented are to consolidate Wittman (05001) with Tilghman VFD (05002) and Bozman (02002), and Royal Oak (02003) with St. Michael's High School (02001).

The first recommendation is the consolidation of Wittman (746 voters) with Tilghman Volunteer Fire Department. By taking these measures this would increase Tilghman Volunteer Fire Department to 1476 voters from the current 730 voters. Tilghman Volunteer Fire Department has the required space to accommodate the recommended social distancing for these additional voters.

The second recommendation is to consolidate Bozman (566 voters) and Royal Oak (1151 voters) with St. Michael's High School. By taking this measure this would increase St. Michael's High School to 3952 voters from the current 2234 voters. St. Michael's High School conducts the election in the gymnasium which has the required space to accommodate the recommended social distancing for these additional voters.

When the local board office contacted the polling places in reference to availability, we received the following responses that should also be considered in the process of consolidating these polling places. Bozman's response was that the church could be used "as-is" but that the church's Peninsula Delaware Conference has said they cannot use the building without disinfecting the ventilation system, which they have not done and have not used the building since the pandemic began. Without the recommended disinfection of the ventilation system being completed, it would pose unknown health risks to the election judges as well as the voters which is an additional concern to the space recommendations. The church used for Royal Oak voters responded apprehensively by saying we could use the building but that they have not used the building since the pandemic and that the county would be responsible for conducting a "clean similar to one that was done at a local restaurant", after the election. This is an additional concern as well as the facility being too small to accommodate the space recommendations.

Lastly, there is a considerable concern of having enough election judges for the polling places on election day. We currently have received responses from approximately one half of the election judges who are willing to work on election day. Some individuals were apprehensive in agreeing to work and there is the concern that if the pandemic becomes more aggressive and the concerns rise for their personal health and safety these election judges will reconsider their offer to work. By consolidating these polling places, it will hopefully allow us to have the appropriate number of election judges on election day.

The Talbot County Board of Elections is requesting approval of the recommended polling place consolidations for the 2020 Presidential General Election from the State Board of Elections. It is important to do everything possible to protect our election judges and the voters of Talbot County during these challenging and unpredictable times.

Dear Administrator Lamone and Members of the Board,

The Expand the Vote Coalition writes today in follow up on our previous correspondence in April, to again urge that you take steps to ensure that eligible incarcerated voters in Maryland have the support and resources they need to cast their ballots in this year's general elections, despite COVID-19.

The vast majority of people in Maryland jails are eligible to vote. Maryland's jail population is largely incarcerated in pretrial detention or for misdemeanor convictions, which do not impair voter eligibility. More than 45 years ago, the Supreme Court held that states could not deny these voters access to the ballot simply because they are incarcerated. Because these voters cannot vote in person, state and local officials have an obligation to provide them with the resources, support, and information they need to cast a mail-in ballot or take advantage of alternative means of voting.

COVID-19 has made this problem even worse. Because of the realities of incarceration—limited access to information, restrictions on third-party contacts, and the inherent delays and difficulties of bureaucracies—voting from jail has always been extremely difficult. But COVID-19 has exacerbated all of these barriers to the ballot box. In the past, volunteer groups could enter jails and provide direct assistance to incarcerated voters. Today, such an effort would not only be ill-advised because it would threaten the health of volunteers, voters, and jail staff alike, it would be impossible in many places because of restrictions on outside visitation and other COVID-19 precautions.

Maryland must commit to making ballots accessible to incarcerated voters during COVID-19, just as it has for non-incarcerated voters. The State Board of Elections has taken several steps to ensure that voting is safe and accessible for non-incarcerated voters, including approving motions to provide them with prepaid mail envelopes for mail-in voting applications for the General Election, to provide two additional vote centers in Baltimore City for the Primary Election, to enact emergency regulations on date stamp requirements for returned mail-in ballots for the Primary Election, and to provide additional ballot drop boxes for local election boards. The State Board of Elections should take further steps to ensure that eligible incarcerated voters likewise have access to the ballot.

We urge the Board to work with the Department of Safety and Correctional Services (DSPCS) on outreach to correctional facilities, including by taking some of the following steps:

- The Department of Safety and Correctional Services (DSPCS) should release names of all detainees to the State Board of Elections so that voter eligibility can be determined.
- The Board of Elections should send both voter registration forms and mail-in ballot applications to these facilities for individuals who want to vote.
- The Board of Elections should provide pre-paid return envelopes and jail drop boxes for easy return of voter registration forms, mail-in ballot applications, and mail-in ballots.
- The Board of Elections should work with both the Department of Safety and Correctional Services and Voting Rights Advocates to provide outreach and assistance through "agents"—either corrections or elections staffers—who can go into the correctional facilities and facilitate voting in-person.
- Incarcerated voters should be provided with information about the changes to upcoming elections and be made aware of their voting options. They should be given the League of Women Voters Maryland nonpartisan voter guide which includes nonpartisan info about the candidates and all changes about elections.

We urge the board to make outreach to eligible incarcerated voters a priority, which will help ensure they have access to the franchise. Please let us know if we can assist in any capacity to further this objective. Thank you for your time and assistance in this matter.
